

Primary care learning for non-pathway pharmacy professionals

The Centre for Postgraduate Pharmacy Education (CPPE) is commissioned to deliver the national *Primary care pharmacy education pathway* (PCPEP), and the previous *Clinical pharmacists in general practice education pathway* and *Medicines optimisation in care homes pathway*. These unique 15 and 18-month training pathways support pharmacy professionals to develop the confidence and competence to work in primary care.

This document highlights the CPPE learning opportunities available to all pharmacy professionals in primary care who are not eligible for one of the extended training pathways.

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For those enrolled or enrolling on the *Primary care pharmacy education pathway* (PCPEP): If you are employed in a primary care network through the additional role reimbursement scheme, the *Primary care pharmacy education pathway* is mandatory (unless you are **exempt**).

Those who are eligible and waiting for enrolment to open for the next cohort can start to work through some of the pathway learning. This is available online for all pharmacy professionals, as outlined in this document. If you complete some of the learning before your cohort starts, you will not need to repeat it.

<p>Mental health e-course The Mental health e-course will equip you with the knowledge and skills to support people with mental health problems who you encounter in your practice. <p>New programme – Shared decision making Shared decision making and personalised care are core elements of the NHS Long Term Plan. Shared decision making is linked to improved outcomes for patients and puts patients at the centre of their own care, making them experts in their own healthcare decisions. The programme is delivered online and consists of an e-course, which must be completed prior to booking and attending two full-day online workshops.</p>	<p>Yes – Module 5 – but you could work through this learning before you start the pathway.</p>	<p>Yes – this programme will help you to develop and enhance your skills so that shared decision making is embedded in your SMRs.
